History of the Agassiz Fall Fair

Kent Agricultural and Horticultural Association was incorporated on November 16, 1899. The name was later officially changed on August 20, 1914, to Agassiz Agricultural and Horticultural Association. There were originally fifteen directors, with executive positions of president, 1st vice-president, 2nd vice-president, treasurer, and secretary. Over the years, many directors have served as president and secretary-treasurer since the association was formed.

The longest-serving executive member is Jack Freeman, who served as president for two years and then as secretary-treasurer for thirty-five years. He was named Mr. Fair for his many contributions to the association's activities. Many of his family members have also helped with the fair. His son, Gerry Freeman, was in charge of the famous chicken Bar-B-Q for over 20 years. The original annual subscription payable by members was two dollars. This has not increased in one hundred years!

The first annual fair was held in 1901. Since then, only four fairs have been cancelled (because of World War II and the 1948 Flood). The first two fairs were held at the Good Templars' Hall. James Morrow, reeve at the time and one of the original directors, was a strong supporter of the Agricultural Association. This support has continued with succeeding district councils. The Morrow horses were the only ones shown at the first fair. At that time, the horse-judging ring was on Pioneer Street. Then, for a few years, the fair was held west of the Dominion Experimental Farm (now Pacific Agri-Food Research Centre). A racecourse was constructed and buildings and barns were built at that site.

In 1912, seven acres of land were purchased at a cost of \$3,500. This is part of the present fairgrounds. Council minutes of November 7, 1913, record a resolution giving the association the right to enter upon and make use of the grounds free of charge.

In 1949, the Corn Festival was initiated when the Agassiz-Harrison Board of Trade decided a festival based on the area's chief crop would be a good way to popularize local industries. Originally, sweet corn was the focus; then a change was made to forage corn, which reflected the increased importance of dairy farming in the area. A corn king has been proclaimed every year. Judging is based on field cleanliness, corn uniformity, maturity, and efficient nitrogen use. The corn king, dressed in royal velvet robes and a crown, is featured in the parade and is formally introduced at the opening ceremonies.

In the week prior to the original festival, members of the Board of Trade could smoke only corn cob pipes and were fined one dollar if they were caught smoking anything else. The festival was popular with visitors from Rosedale and Chilliwack, and a special ferry was held on the north side of the Fraser River until midnight, since there was no Agassiz-Rosedale Bridge at that time. A few years later, the Agricultural Association was asked to organize the Corn Festival and there the two events are now held as a single event.

The original hall, built in 1916, was replaced in two phases. Phase I was officially opened in 1983 and a major addition, Phase II was open in 1987. There is a modern kitchen, large auditorium, and numerous meeting rooms. The Livestock Pavilion was erected in the early 1970's and several improvements have been made. With the addition of new kitchen facilities, insulation, new siding, and a fresh coat of paint, it can now be used for other functions such as dances, bingo, children's indoor soccer, and floor hockey. The association owns an outdoor stage and closed-in picnic shelter. These facilities are fully utilized at fair time; therefore, numerous tents are erected for a petting zoo, animal shelters, bingo, and an eating area. The association runs a weekly bingo to raise funds to maintain and improve the building facilities.

The fair is adapting to changes, while still trying to retain an "old-time flavour". For many Agassiz residents, it is a reunion weekend with families uniting for a visit, a "day at the fair", and a chance to sample the famous chicken and corn barbeque. Attendance has been increasing; 1995 was a record year with more than 4,800 people attending and 2,578 entries submitted for judging. A new record was set in 1998 when over 7,200 people attended. The Agassiz Fall Fair and Corn Festival was chosen Fair of the Year in 1995 and again in 1998 in its size category by the BC Fairs Association.

Several years ago, Betty Duncan, who was craft section convener at the time, added

many new categories for children, including a colouring contest. This considerably increased the craft entries. Our fruit, vegetable, and flower sections have usually been well represented and long-time convenor, John Lanting, has added more children's classes there as well. To fit in with the corn theme, there is a special corn section that includes such things as largest sweet corn, forage corn cobs, cornhusk dolls, and popcorn figures. The popular annual parade travels through the main section of town and ends at the fairgrounds. People then enter the fairgrounds for the official opening and to enjoy all the activities.

The interest in "new farm animals", at least to the Agassiz area, has added to the variety of animals at the fair. Starting in the 1990's, emus, alpacas, and llamas were added to go along with the more traditional animals such as horses, cows, pigs, sheep, goats, and chickens.

In the 1990's, Rita Bruniski and Lee Struthers worked hard to computerize all aspects of the exhibit entries. This has made it easier to prepare the entry tags and pay out prize money. The entries, except for livestock, are judged on Friday afternoon. The results are entered into the computer and all prize money is automatically calculated. Winners can then pick up their prize money at the Corn Bank the next day during the fair.

Saturday is still the main day of the fair, but in 1990, due to popular demand, activities were added on Friday night including entertainment and a midway. On Saturday, feature performers include many local dancers, singers, and musicians. A corn husking competition is popular. Agriculture education content is now stressed at the fair as there are so few people who are directly involved with farming. This is an ongoing project and every year more information is available for fair attendees.

Our dedicated volunteers ensure the success of our fair and our weekly bingo. Several volunteers have been named life members of the association because of their long service and dedication. Special awards of merit have gone to Edelgard Wiehler and Elfrieda Knoll. Another outstanding volunteer was Bert Ledoux, who was parade marshal for many years.

For many years, the association has supported the youth of the community by sponsoring the 4-H group and also allowing the scouting and guiding association to have their weekly meetings and activities in the hall.

CONSTITUTION

1. The name of the Association shall be the Agassiz Agricultural and Horticultural Association
2. The purposes of the Association shall be:
 - a) To protect and advance agriculture, horticulture and fruit-growing interests within the western portion of Yale, Kootenay and eastern portions of Westminster Counties, and more particularly defined as the District of Kent, in the Province of British Columbia.
 - b) To hold exhibitions or otherwise as the Society may deem in its best interest.
3. The Agassiz Agricultural and Horticultural Association guarantees that the facility, including the livestock barn, horse arena, concession stand and public washrooms, will be available to any person or persons who wish to use it in accordance with the purpose of the facility, and that the charge for using the said facility, including the livestock barn, horse arena, concession stand and public washrooms, to those members of the public who are not members of the Agassiz Agricultural and Horticultural Association shall be either a daily or hourly charge agreed upon between the Agassiz Agricultural and Horticultural Association and the Department of Recreation and Conservation, and in the event of the dissolution of the Agassiz Agricultural and Horticultural Association, any assets remaining after payment of all debts and obligations shall be distributed to a recognized charitable organization in the Province of British Columbia with similar objects or to a suitable level of local government. These provisions in reference to public access and dissolution are unalterable.
4. The official place of holding exhibitions and principle place of business of the Society shall be at Agassiz, in the Municipality which is The Corporation of the District of Kent, in the Province of British Columbia. This provision is alterable.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

All Rules Will Be Strictly Enforced

1. All entry forms, accompanied by entry fee, must be mailed to the Secretary, Box 451, Agassiz, B.C. V0M 1A0, before September 1 or delivered to the Entry Clerk at the Agricultural Hall on Wednesday, September 7 between 7 p.m. - 9 p.m. or on Thursday, September 8 between 1 p.m. - 9 p.m.
**POSITIVELY NO ENTRIES WILL BE TAKEN AFTER THIS DAY.
ONE ENTRY FORM PER EXHIBITOR PLEASE.**
2. All exhibits - to be delivered between 3pm - 9pm to the exhibition building in place and ready for judging not later than 9 p.m. Thursday, September 15, 2011. .
Division G exhibits to be in cages in the Bella Vista room in the Ag Hall for judging BEFORE 10:00 a.m. on the morning of the Fair, September 17, 2011.
3. No exhibits to be removed before 7:00 p.m. on the day of the Fair, except where otherwise noted.
Division G exhibits to be removed by 4:30 p.m. on the day of the fair.
4. The Association will not be liable for any loss or damage to the exhibits.
5. No exhibitor shall be awarded more than one prize in any one class, but this rule does not apply to animals competing in their own class.
6. Judges shall have the power to withhold prizes from any exhibitor they deem of insufficient merit.
7. All articles of produce must be bona-fide the production of the exhibitor and the product of 2011. Stock exhibits must have been in British Columbia and the property of the exhibitor for 14 days prior to the show. All articles and work must be made by the exhibitor and not previously exhibited in Agassiz.
8. Judges shall take into consideration the soundness, market value and general fitness of horses and stock for the class in which they are exhibited.
9. All exhibits of stock and articles of manufacture of every kind are eligible for entry for prizes only by owner or authorized agent(s).
10. The President and Board of Directors of the Association shall have the supervision of the grounds and exhibits generally.
11. Water for stock will be provided on the grounds.
12. No person shall interfere with the judges while in the discharge of their duties or thereafter use contemptuous or abusive language to any judge in reference to the awards may by said judge(s).
13. Any person knowingly violating any of the rules of the Association will thereafter forfeit and be barred from receiving any premiums that may be awarded him/her, and may also be excluded from exhibiting in future for such period as the Board of Directors decide.
14. In case there are not enough funds to pay all prizes in full, they will be paid pro-rata.
15. Should there arise any dispute or misunderstanding not governed by the by-laws or rules and regulations of the Association, it shall be referred to the Board of Directors whose decision shall be final.
16. All protests and appeals must be made in writing, must state plainly the cause of complaints with a deposit of \$25.00 and must be delivered to the Secretary before 4:00 p.m. on the day of the exhibition. In case the protest is not sustained, the deposit is forfeited and added to the funds of the exhibition.
17. No names will appear on exhibits or be in possession of judges until after the awards are made, when the same will be affixed to the prize ticket(s).
18. In the absence of competition in any section the judges will award prizes only as they see fit.
ONE ENTRY IN A CLASS DOES NOT GUARANTEE A PRIZE
19. No person shall make more than one entry in each class in Divisions H, I, J, K, L, M, N, O, P, Q, R and S. Two or more persons may not exhibit in the same class for prizes, from the same garden, orchard greenhouse, nursery or farm for Divisions H, I, J, K and L.
20. All prize cards awarded by the judges must be displayed on the articles during the exhibition. Any infraction of this rule will incur the forfeiture of any premium awarded.

21. Exhibitors must send a list of their awards to the secretary within one month from the date of the Fair, **IF NOT PICKED UP AT THE CORN BANK ON THE DAY OF THE FAIR. After October 15, 2011 prize money not claimed will be considered a donation to the exhibition.**
22. Payment of a single membership of \$2.00 entitles a member to all privileges under the rules of the Society governing membership. This does not include admission to the exhibition.
23. Awards for "Most Points" in divisions will be calculated on the following basis: First prize scores 3 points - Second prize scores 2 points - Third prize scores 1 point.
24. All classes will have one prize for first, second, third and fourth placings.
